Relationship Training Classes Restore Broken Families, Create Generational Healing for Dads, Moms and Kids

Relationship training classes offered by the **Spokane Fatherhood Initiative (SPOFI)** have proven to be highly effective in healing family relationships, according to SPOFI founder and President Ron Hauenstein. “In every class we offer, we hear progress reports of dads connecting with their kids, sometimes after years of separation. We believe that these children who now feel a new sense of love and value will become better parents themselves someday.”

SPOFI has been offering comprehensive fatherhood classes since September of 2018, and recently added a communications course for moms called Understanding Dad.

“Father absence is the greatest social challenge we face today,” Hauenstein said, “Never before in this country have so many children been voluntarily abandoned by their fathers. Never before have so many children grown up without knowing what it means to have a father.”

“Our classes are a great combination of introspection that leads to character growth and behavioral change, plus parenting tips dads can add to their toolbox. At the outset, many dads enter their first class discouraged and pessimistic, but after just one or two sessions they develop a new sense of hope and optimism

for the future. Much of this emotional boost comes from being around other dads who face similar relationship challenges. Once men learn they are not alone and they find a safe place to share their concerns, they find new energy to address their problems. It’s a fascinating process to watch.”

Dads Share Remarkable, Inspiring Testimonies of Personal Growth and Reunification With Their Children Thanks to SpoFI Classes



“I want to be in my kids’ lives because my dad was not in mine.”

Josiah Robinson has not seen his two young children since March 21, 2020, but the training he received through SpoFI’s fatherhood classes is rapidly moving him to a day of reunification. Because of SpoFI, he says, he is a lot more confident and a lot more patient. “I no longer see myself as a failure but as work in progress. It means the absolute world to me to be just one step closer to getting my kids back.”

Abandoned by his father, Nick dedicates himself to connect with his kids

Nick Marzano has not seen his father since he was 11 and half years old. His father wound contributed to a life of addiction and walking away from his responsibilities as a father. Although he’s been clean for nine years, Nick had no contact with four of his five children for more than 15 years until the summer of 2022. Through SpoFI’s fatherhood classes, he was inspired to reach out to his children. Using social media, three of the four have responded positively and now communicate regularly with Nick. “My father’s absence doesn’t mean my kids deserve my absence,” Nick says.

After seven years of absence, son tells dad, “I always knew you’d come back.”

When James Tidwell enrolled in SpoFI fatherhood classes in November of 2019, he had not seen his four children in nearly five years. After two years of nonstop effort, James was finally reunited with his kids in a supervised visit Oct. 16, 2021. A year later, James has his children every other weekend and participates in their lives many times in between. When he offered a recent apology for his long absence, his 10-year-old son said “Dad, I always knew you’d come back.” His steadfast commitment to personal growth and development and his passionate desire to connect with his kids earned James the 2022 non-custodial Father of the Year Award from SpoFI.



Dad belittled as child learns his true value as a father through SpoFI

Morpheus Oneiroi never was affirmed as a child. “It was a constant message growing up that I was a bad kid...I was always told to be good. I was never told that I was good. SpoFI gives us this space where we can speak about our concerns, we can speak about our doubts, and we can get validated and encouraged to do better. It is with your [SpoFI donor] support, my daughter has her father very present in her life. I can’t express my gratitude enough for you.”

Responsible Fatherhood Training Produces Potential of \$177,000 in Benefits versus \$900 Cost of Programs

Is it possible to measure the economic value of good parenting? Some recent research says yes, and even provides a dollar value.

A study conducted for the Fatherhood Research and Practice Network estimates the total economic value of benefits due to successful participation in a Responsible Fatherhood program could reach about \$177,000 per father and about \$32,000 to \$38,000 per child.

How does responsible fathering translate into economic benefits? Simply put, dads who become committed to their children become better men who invest in themselves and support their families through hard work and sacrifice. As a result, participants in Responsible Fatherhood programs similar to SpoFI's experience:

- Improved education, employment and wage rates, which is associated with increased child support payments, tax revenues and avoided or reduced costs of unemployment, welfare, food, assistance and arrests.
- Positive father involvement in the lives of their children, which improves their children's social-emotional and cognitive competence

SpoFI Programs Restore the Value of Fatherhood

The Spokane Fatherhood Initiative incorporated as a faith-based, 501(c)(3) non-profit in July of 2017 with the vision and mission to **restore the value of fatherhood so that every child has a present, loving and nurturing father**. SpoFI fulfills its vision and mission by offering:

- Relationship Training classes for dads and moms
- Direct Services for Families
- Community Education Events

The goal of SpoFI's training programs is to help dads and moms adopt the tools, skills and behavioral changes they need to become better spouses, parents and partners. We believe that cultural change occurs generationally so that equipping men and women to be better parents will result in children better equipped to change the future and reduce the social problems we see today.

Through SpoFI's programs, dads and moms get the tools, training, and encouragement they need to restore communication and relationship with their children and with each other. We have witnessed father-and-child reunification

dozens of times, in many cases after years of separation, much like what we see in Malachi 4:6: "And he will turn the hearts of fathers to their children and the hearts of children to their fathers..."

In addition, SpoFI:

- Provides guidance, support and technical assistance to navigate the complex child welfare system and family court.
- Provides reentry support to Returning Citizens released from prison.
- Stages community workshops and outreach programs
- Trains and supports foster and adoptive families through a sub-ministry called Spokane127 www.spokane127.org.
